We are proud to bring you our first Annual Report, marking the first seven months of our organization. On May 8, 2020, we launched Voces Unidas de las Montañas with a vision of increasing the power and influence of the Latino community in the central mountain region.

Thanks to the generous support of foundations and individual donors, and the leadership of our leaders and volunteers, Voces Unidas was able to accomplish the following:

- 242 Latino leaders and volunteers practiced leadership in an unprecedented year that demanded leadership from all of us;
- More than 1,675 advocacy actions were taken by members of the community about important issues like COVID-19, immigration, access to healthcare and others;
- 2,362 members of the community were helped with food baskets, direct financial aid or one-on-one referral services during one of the most devastating public health crises of our time; and
- More than 14,000 likely Latino voters were reached in the most critical election of our lifetime.

Together, we reached 32,834 community members with information and programs in 2020. So thank you, from all of us at Voces Unidas, for your partnership and unwavering support in 2020.



Voces Unidas de las Montañas was founded in May 2020 by local Latina and Latino leaders and is the first Latinocreated, Latino-led advocacy nonprofit in the central mountain region of Colorado. The central mountain region of Colorado includes Summit, Lake, Eagle, Pitkin, and Garfield counties. The founders created the organization to elevate the voices of Latinas and Latinos, create opportunities where Latinas and Latinos can advocate for themselves, and increase Latina and Latino representation and participation at decision-making tables.

OUR WORK

LEADERSHIP

We support the growth and education of Latina and Latino leaders through culturally and linguistically effective leadership programs. These programs place leaders in opportunities where they can lead in their own communities to create systems change.

ADVOCACY

We organize and mobilize Latina and Latino leaders to change inequitable systems. We also advocate to change and improve public policies at the local, state and federal level.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

We educate and mobilize Latino voters to increase participation in local elections. The civic education programs include non-partisan voter registration drives, issue education and get out the vote initiatives.

RESOURCES

We take our role as the first Latinocreated advocacy organization very seriously because we know that we are a trusted community resource. We do our part to provide essential information and connect our leaders to critical resources.

2020 IN REVIEW

In 2020, Voces Unidas reached 32,834 community members with information and programs.

OUR ROLE IN COVID-19 RESPONSE

In 2020, Voces Unidas was at the forefront of advocating for our community with local/state governments and the legislature.

LEADERS IN HEALTH EQUITY RESPONSE

Governor Polis established the COVID-19 Health Equity Response Team in April 2020 to ensure that no community was left behind; Voces Unidas Founder and Executive Director Alex Sánchez was appointed to this important Taskforce.

A RESOURCE FOR OUR COMMUNITY

With leaders as volunteers, Voces Unidas provided more than \$30,000 in direct economic assistance for rent and other essential needs, distributed more than 1,500 food baskets, and provided more than 10,000 masks and other personal protective equipment. We also reached thousands of Latinos through a virtual call center, connecting Spanish-dominant members of the community to critical aid and resources in the region.

ADVOCATES ACTING ON COMMUNITY CONCERNS

Voces Unidas captured direct community feedback throughout the pandemic and used it to demand more genuine and honest inclusion of Latinos in decision-making processes in all COVID-19 response and recovery efforts at the local and statewide levels. We issued seven specific demands of county governments in the tri-county area to protect Latino essential workers who were at a higher risk of contracting the virus. Our leaders also sent hundreds of letters to Garfield County commissioners demanding that they publish all county information in Spanish, provide access to relief funds regardless of immigration status, and guarantee access to healthcare for the uninsured.

FILLING GAPS IN THE ECOSYSTEM

Voces Unidas launched a Promotora Program in November 2020 to model culturally competent, bilingual support to Latinas and Latinos in Pitkin, Eagle and Garfield Counties.

Our trained community navigators

helped Latinos who tested positive for COVID-19, or who were exposed, get access to care and navigate resources.

As part of the initiative, we **provided** resources and financial aid to those who lost work during the pandemic and did not qualify for assistance due to immigration status or other factors.

We encouraged all three counties to increase Latino outreach and bring in more Spanish-speaking and multicultural staff.

As an advocacy organization, we inserted ourselves and modeled best practices when we felt that our local governments or the ecosystem were failing Latinos and/or neglecting their responsibilities to our community.

HISTORIC VOTER TURNOUT FOR LATINOS IN 2020

Across the country, Latino voters turned out in historic numbers in the 2020 election. This is also true for our state and region.

Thanks to Latino voters, Colorado passed paid family and medical leave, new tax revenue for early childhood education, and also defeated a cruel abortion ban.

Locally, the number of Latinos voting in Garfield, Eagle and Pitkin counties increased substantially compared to 2016.

Our get-out-the-vote efforts reached more than 14,000 likely Latino voters in Garfield, Eagle, and Pitkin counties through phone calls, text messages, mailers, Facebook ads, and even some door-to-door canvassing.
